

Clinical Professor Nominees (in alphabetical order)

Dr. Stephen Anderson, MD, FRCPC

Dr. Stephen Anderson graduated from the UBC psychiatric program in 1989 and joined the Department's clinical faculty in the same year. He has been teaching psychiatry, neurology and surgical residents on the VGH psychiatric consultation-liaison service since 1992. He has served on several hospital committees over the years. For the past five years he has been a physician representative on the Vancouver Acute/Critical/Palliative Ethics Committee. He received commendation from the Dean of Medicine in 2019 for 35 years' service to the UBC medical school. Stephen has been the psychiatrist for the Provincial Burn Unit since 1992. He is a Distinguished Life Fellow of the American Psychiatric Association and a Clinical Professor in the UBC Faculty of Medicine.

Dr. Caroline Gosselin, MD, FRCPC

Dr. Caroline Gosselin is Clinical Professor and Geriatric Division member of the UBC Department of Psychiatry and is in active geriatric psychiatry practice at the Vancouver General Hospital. Caroline is a Founding Member of the RCPSC Geriatric Psychiatry subspecialty and she was Chief Examiner for the English RCPSC Psychiatry Examination Board between 2014 and 2018. She is a co-founder of the Canadian ECT Survey (CANECTS/ECANEC I), Co-Chair of the Canadian ECT Standards (CANECTS/ECANEC II) and is an award-winning educator. Caroline is also a contributing author of the BC ECT Guidelines. Her active role continues in directing postgraduate ECT education at UBC, in research, and in conducting ECT clinic audits.

Dr. John Higenbottam, BA, MA, PhD, RPsych

Dr. John Higenbottam is currently a Clinical Professor and a long-standing Department member since 1990. He is a clinical psychologist and neuropsychologist with extensive experience as a clinician, educator and health systems administrator. He has held senior health leadership positions in BC, including Vice President, Riverview Hospital and Vice President, Vancouver Hospital and Health Sciences Centre responsible for hospital and community Psychiatry services. Accomplishments include starting BC's first ACT Teams and developing the BC Neuropsychiatry Program. John was Chair of CAMIMH, Canada's major alliance of mental health organizations, for two terms, as well as Chair, PSR Canada and PSR BC. He is currently Editor-in-Chief, *Canadian Journal of Community Mental Health* and is on the Leadership Council of BC's Community Action Initiative. He has served on the Clinical Faculty Appointment Promotion and Tenure Committee (CFAPC) since 2011. Additionally, John served as the Department of Psychiatry rep on UBC's Clinical Research Ethics Board for several years.

Dr. Harry Karlinsky, MD, MSc, FRCPC

Harry Karlinsky obtained his M.D. from the University of Manitoba, his specialty degree in Psychiatry and Fellowship in Geriatric Psychiatry from the University of Toronto, and his Master's in Neuroscience degree from the University of London, England. He is currently the Psychiatric Consultant for WorkSafeBC, a Clinical Professor with UBC Psychiatry, and is the founding and ongoing Director of the [Frames of Mind Mental Health Film Series](#) and the Department's Lucid Book Club and Author Reading Series. Harry's publications range from peer-reviewed academic articles and co-edited textbooks to fiction and creative non-fiction. His first novel, *The Evolution of Inanimate Objects* was longlisted for the Wellcome Trust Book Prize which celebrates themes of medicine in literature. Harry also has a longstanding commitment to professional and public education, and has presented nationally and internationally on topics ranging from Alzheimer's disease to IT to narrative medicine to PTSD, and to the use of films in health care education. Honours include Baycrest Hospital's Munk Geriatric Award, the CPA/COPCE Award for outstanding Continuing Medical Education Activity in Canada, the Lil Hewton Bursary Award to conduct archival research related to the history of psychiatry, and the inaugural UBC FoM Innovation in CME award.
